- 1 Mohaka Ward Councillor
- 1 Kahuranaki Ward Councillor

1 non-voting Youth Council appointee (having an additional member was requested by Community Board on 24 May 2021 and confirmed by Council on 24 June 2021)

Quorum – 4 members

DELEGATED POWERS General

- 1. To maintain an overview of services provided by the Council within the Community Board's area.
- 2. To represent, and act as an advocate for, the interests of the community represented.
- 3. To consider and report on all matters referred to the Board by the Council, or any matter of interest or concern to the Community Board.
- 4. To communicate with community organisations and special interest groups within the community;
- 5. To undertake any other responsibilities that are delegated to it by the Council.
- 6. To appoint a member of the Community Board to organisations approved by the Council from time to time.

LONG TERM PLAN/ANNUAL PLAN/POLICY ISSUES

7. Authority to make a submission to the Long Term Plan/Annual Plan process on activities, service levels and expenditure (including capital works priorities) within the Board's area or to make a submission in relation to any policy matter which may have an effect within the Board's area.

ROADING AND TRAFFIC

- 8. Authority to exercise the Council's powers and functions in relation to roads within the Board's area under the following sections of the Local Government Act 1974:
 - Section 335 (vehicle crossings);
 - Section 344 (gates and cattle stops);
 - Section 355 (overhanging trees).
- 9. Authority to exercise the Council's statutory powers (including any relevant powers conferred by bylaw) over roads within the Board's area in respect of:
 - (i) Road user behaviour at intersections;
 - (ii) Controls on stopping or overtaking
 - (iii) Controls on turning
 - (iv) Pedestrian safety,
 - (v) Footpath maintenance and improvements.
 - (vi) Accident investigation studies, lighting and other safety works

10. For the avoidance of doubt, nothing in this delegation authorises a Community Board to deal with a matter, in the exercise of delegated authority, in a manner which is conflict with any policy or decision of the Council or any standing committee of the Council in relation to the same matter.

The Eco District Strategic Overview was approved by the Strategy and Policy Committee on 2 November 2021.
- 1.2 The Eco District Subcommittee is responsible for advising the Strategy and Policy Committee by:
 - Providing guidance to Council Officers in respect of the drafting of Councils Eco District Strategy and providing oversight of community engagement through the Special Consultative Procedures.
 - Providing oversight of the implementation of Council's Eco District Strategies.
 - Providing oversight of the implementation of Council's Green Corridor, Reserve Management Plans, Climate Change, Coastal Hazards, Sustainability and Biodiversity strategies, along with sustainability considerations within Council's key infrastructural areas.
- 1.3 The Strategic Overview is primarily intended as a tool to support the effective delivery of the Eco District Subcommittee's responsibilities that contributes to environmental sustainability of our district. It outlines a high level overview of Council's planned activities for each priority area. As noted above it will evolve as our context and priorities change.
- 1.4 The strategy contains a wide range of actions with many of the initial items around improving Councils awareness and an understanding to better inform likely more significant future decisions. It also highlights the approach of closer working with key partners to reduce duplication and where appropriate shared initiatives.

- 1.5 The strategic overview highlights 4 priority areas of focus:
 - Water and Land resources used wisely
 - A better climate and carbon future
 - The natural environment is enhanced and protected
 - Council Services are green and healthy

 - Transportation



1.0 Executive Summary – *Te Kaupapa Me Te Whakarāpopototanga*

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide an update on current rural recycling site behaviours, new initiatives/trial proposals and current trial update within the Waipātiki Beach Community.
- 1.2 This matter arises from several community request to increase access to recycling facilities, with recent communication from the Eskdale and Maraetōtara Communities.

2.0 Recommendations – Ngā Tūtohunga

- A) That the Rural Community Board receive the report titled Rural Community Recycling Facilities Update dated 29 November 2021.
- B) That the Rural Community Board note the initiatives outlined in this report including Maraekākaho, Pukehamoamoa, Poukawa, Waimārama, Tūtira, Henderson Road and Blackbridge and provide feedback. The success of any trial or initiative will be measured on participation, contamination and illegal dumping at the site.
- C) That the Rural Community Board approves officers continuing to work with the Eskdale community to identify suitable recycling site options.

3.0 Background – Te Horopaki

- 3.1 Rural recycling facilities provide a drop off service for common recyclables; glass, plastics, cans, paper and cardboard.
- 3.2 With the recent re-engagement with the Eskdale community to highlight potential sites, the community will identify what they believe to be an adequate site, the HDC Solid Waste Operations and Contract Manager will review and mock up a site plan/s and present to relative compliance personnel and the RCB for suitability/approval.
- 3.3 Consultation with Napier City Council (NCC) would be required as NCC residents would also utilise a facility with a financial contribution from NCC being discussed/appropriate.
- 3.4 The reasons provided from the community for this facility are:
- 3.4.1 Closure of the Waste Management Facility in Niven St, Napier which has significantly impacted the Eskdale residents' access to a recycling facility.
- 3.4.2 The extra travel time to either the Redclyffe Recycling facility or Henderson Rd Recycling Facility and it is generally a trip out of their way, rather than "on the way" when shopping in Napier.
- 3.4.3 It will also allow the rural residents from wider Te Pōhue, Tangoio communities access to a facility that is convenient when travelling into town/work.
- 3.5 Waipātiki Beach Community will have a permanent site established, with planning underway based on a very successful 12mth trial.
- 3.6 All other Rural Recycling Sites update;
- 3.6.1 Maraekākaho no significant issues and community are actively reporting issues.
- 3.6.2 Pukehamoamoa very minor, but consistent contamination reported by the contractor and the site has been relatively free from significant illegal dumping practices. HDC are in regular contact with their community champion Deborah Grace.
- 3.6.3 Poukawa no significant contamination or illegal dumping behaviour has been highlighted.
- 3.6.4 Waimārama This site remains challenging, with regular contamination issues. As these are highlighted, imagery is sent to the local councillors to ensure they are aware.
- 3.6.5 Waimārama will continue to be reviewed, with a 3rd bin being placed on the grass area for the Christmas/New year period for Plastics and Cans the site's viability will be reviewed in the New Year, once the busy holiday period has passed, and reported back to the RCB.
- 3.6.6 Tūtira this site remains relatively good, with recent engagement with the local school and Rural Community Board member. A fridge was recently removed from the site by HDC contractor – Rec Services
- 3.6.7 Henderson Rd and Blackbridge recycling centres continue to be very good, based on their location within a manned Refuse Transfer Station (RTS) environment.

4.0 Discussion – Te Matapakitanga

- 4.1 In the 2014/2015 Annual Plan, Council resolved to proceed with the development of rural recycling facilities, looking at a potential eight sites across the district. Since then five permanent sites have been established.
- 4.2 In 2019 a new recycling service contract was procured and this new contract allows for additional sites to be serviced under the contract.
- 4.3 The current annual budget for servicing the seven rural recycling sites is \$65,000 pa. There are sufficient funds to cover estimated additional servicing costs in the 2021/22 budget for rural recycling.

- 4.4 The Waipātiki trial has been a large success with a permanent site to be established. This would consist of a concrete pad in the road reserve and a fixed platform design for ease of servicing.
- 4.5 Estimated costs to establish a permanent site would be circa \$25,000 as a one off cost. No consents are required as land is HDC owned and site is already establish in the road reserve area.
- 4.6 The funds to establish the Waipātiki site would come from the Waste Minimisation fund and we would seek approval from Group Manager Asset Management.
- 4.7 Once permanently established, the site would continue to significantly benefit the community.
- 4.8 The Maraetōtara bin placement options have been investigated, with no suitable site apparent without significant modifications.
- 4.9 No other sites have been identified in the investigation process. The last area identified and preferred option by residents was circa a 10 minute drive to the Waimārama Recycling facility.
- 4.10 There has been some recent engagement with the Eskdale community to highlight potential sites which will require consultation with Napier City Council (NCC) as NCC residents would also utilise a facility with a financial contribution from NCC being discussed/appropriate.

5.0 Options – Ngā Kōwhiringa

Option One - Recommended Option - Te Kowhiringa Tuatahi – Te Kowhiringa Tutohunga

- 5.1 Continue to work with the Eskdale Community to highlight any potential site options.
- 5.2 Engagement with NCC to gauge their respective interest and appetite to co-fund.
- 5.3 Once a site that is found to be suitable, present to the Rural Community Board highlighting advantages and disadvantages, as both HDC and NCC residents would have access and use the facility.
- 5.4 Advantages
 - Provides a recycling service to residents in the Eskdale and wider rural community.
 - Minimises/mitigates the public leaving recyclables next to toilets, public litter bins and in car parks, thereby reducing Council clean-up costs.
 - Community to monitor and "own" to ensure the site is looked after.
 - Bin provision will be covered using the existing fleet of green bins and with no purchase required.
 - Eskdale site to be explored only at this stage, but no assets will need to be purchased once a site has been found that is suitable.
- 5.5 Disadvantages
 - Contamination of product within bins with visitors using site/bin as dumping ground for rubbish (as it is unmanned).
 - The site may have to be closed if contamination levels become a problem in line with the decision-making framework to temporarily close rural recycling facilities endorsed by the Rural Community Board, 30 November 2020.
 - Success of the trial will be assessed on the following points;
 - Participation / use of the facility measured through number of times the bin is serviced over the trial period.
 - Contamination of recycling material, to be less than 2% at all times.
 - No illegal dumping of rubbish at the site.

Option Two – Status Quo - Te Kōwhiringa Tuarua – Te Āhuatanga o nāianei

5.6 The investigation is not supported and residents are required to continue to utilise current facilities that are out of their normal travel route and/or discard recyclables in the waste stream.

6.0 Next steps – Te Anga Whakamua

6.1 Officers will mock up a site/s that could potentially be suitable as a rural recycling facility within the Eskdale catchment area as requested from the Hastings District Rural Community Board.

This decision/report has been assessed under the Council's Significance and Engagement Policy as being not of significance.

Consultation – internal and/or external - *Whakawhiti Whakaaro-ā-roto / ā-waho*

Consultation regarding rural recycling facilities was undertaken as part of the 2014/2015 Annual Plan, no further consultation is required.

Risks

Opportunity: to extend rural recycling services in line with action 4E of the Joint Waste Management and Minimisation Plan.

REWARD – <i>Te Utu</i>	RISK – <i>Te Tūraru</i>
Increased accessibility to recycling facilities to support the aims and targets of the Joint Waste Management and Minimisation Plan, to increase recycling by 20%.	There is a risk that the site may be subjected to dumping of rubbish or contamination of recyclable material. There is no higher risk at this site than any other rural recycling site. The community will be responsible for the management and oversight of use on a daily basis. Additional cost to service may exceed existing budget.

1.0 Purpose and summary - Te Kaupapa Me Te Whakarāpopototanga

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide an update on the Representation Review 2021.
- 1.2 At its meeting on 14 October 2021, the Council heard and considered submissions to the initial proposal. The Council ultimately decided to adopt the Initial Proposal as its Final Proposal for its representation arrangements for the 2022 local elections, i.e.
 - 15 Members elected from 6 wards, and the Mayor
 - 5 General Wards
 - Flaxmere (1 Councillor)
 - Hastings-Havelock North (7 Councillors)
 - Heretaunga (2 Councillors)
 - Kahurānaki (1 Councillor)
 - Mōhaka (1 Councillor)
 - 1 Māori Ward
 - Takitimu comprising the area of the whole of the Hastings District (3 Councillors)

The representation of the Flaxmere Ward falls outside the +/-10% range as it is underrepresented at 14.46% deviation from the average population per councillor. The representation for the Heretaunga Ward falls outside the +/-10% range as it is overrepresented at -11.18% deviation from the average population per councillor.

The representation for the Kahurānaki Ward falls outside the stipulated range as it is overrepresented at the -12.02% deviation from the average population per councillor.

- Hastings District Rural Community Board covering the general and Māori electoral populations of the Mōhaka and Kahurānaki Wards. Membership of the Board to comprise the 4 Community Board Members and 3 Council appointees (2 rural ward councillors and 1 Māori ward councillor)
 - - Tūtira Subdivision (Mohaka Ward)
 - Kaweka Subdivision (Mohaka Ward)
 - Maraekākaho Subdivision (Kahurānaki Ward)
 - Poukawa Subdivision (Kahurānaki Ward)

The population each Community Board Member represents falls within the range of +/-10% in accordance with section 19V(2), Local Electoral Act 2001.

- 1.3 The Final Proposal contains a number of boundary adjustments from existing arrangements that affect some of the general wards and Rural Community Board electoral subdivisions.
- 1.4 The Final Proposal was publicly notified on 20 October 2021. All submitters have been written to advising them of Council's decision and of their right to Appeal the decision. There is no general right of objection. The closing date for appeals is 26 November 2021.
- 1.5 Because the Final Proposal contains proposals for representation which are outside the stipulated range of +/-10%, Council is required to refer the proposal to the Local Government Commission regardless of whether or not any appeals are received. Following the close of the appeal period, Council will forward any appeals received and other relevant information to the Local Government Commission for determination. The Local Government Commission is required to issue its decision by early April 2022.

3.2 The following is the status of the final Area Wide Pavement Treatment programme for the 2020/21 financial year.

4.0 Bridge Update

- 4.1 Rissington Bridge vertical clearance upgrade is complete. The bridge closure was opened one week earlier than predicted.
- 4.2 Tawa Bridge and Heays Gorge Bridge strengthening works are expected to undergo tendering in December. Construction is expected in February onwards.
- 4.3 The material prices and lead times to get material to New Zealand have increased significantly and is expected to impact the original cost estimates created for the bridge strengthening programme.

5.0 Dust Sealing

5.1 A request has been received to seal approximately 160m on Hawkston Road for dust purposes. Council has a dust mitigation policy that requires the Rural Community Board to approve funding these in accordance with the policy when request are made and the Transport Operations Manager recommends it.

- 5.2 The section of road complies with the policy, and the initial estimate is \$27,000 to seal to a 6m width. The customers are willing to pay the 46% local share (\$12,420) which requires the Rural Community Board to approve funding the remaining \$14,580.
- 5.3 Budgets of \$50,000 p.a. exist specifically for this type of work.















